WHAT'S NEW: POOL OPENING!

Believe it or not, the pool will be open before the next newsletter comes out, so we get to talk about it now!

Weather permitting, we will be open on weekends only beginning 05/28/11 (Mem. Day Wknd) until schools let out (towards the end of June). After that, the pool will be open daily from 10am until 8pm through the summer. Lifeguards will hang an "Open" flag in plain view whenever the pool is open, so just glance out your window or give the Leasing Office a call if you're not sure.

A note on parking: the cul-de-sac in front of the leas-

ing office is a fire lane and parking there is prohibited. Unfortunately, the Town will not allow us to create a parking lot on the other side of the stream without connecting the end of Hendrix Rd through to the "other" Hendrix Rd (near West Town Village). This will not be done until the vacant land in that area is developed and plans for Phase III are on hold until the economy completely recovers.

We hope that you will take the opportunity to say hello to your neighbors, and make the



short walk over to the pool. If you must drive, please park in an available space along Gilmour, or parallel park along the straight portion of Hendrix Road to avoid being towed by the Town.
